Welcome An introduction to BD Horse Care

Taking your Horse Care assessments

There are five tiers to British Dressage Horse Care, starting at the 'Introductory Care Certificate' and progressing up to the 'Advanced Care Certificate'.

To complete each tier of BD Horse Care you will need to complete all of the practical assessment criteria as well as the online modules.

To start the online modules you will need to register through the BD website for the small fee of £5 per certificate. Practical assessments are arranged through your region.

When you have completed all of the online modules and the practical assessment form has been completed by a Horse Care assessor and submitted to Head Office you will be issued with an online certificate.

How to register

To enrol for a certificate, head to the BD website and follow the link to book onto the relevant level certificate. Registration will cost £5 and you will be issued with a link to the online platform to start working towards the certificate.

Considering the practical assessment? Register interest with your **DO to find out when there is an assessment day near you!**

Using the criteria sheet

In this booklet there is a criteria sheet for each Horse Care tier, this should help you to work out what you need to do to pass each certificate.

If you think you need any training to achieve a certificate, contact your region to find a coach or find out what training is organised in your area.

When you go to an assessment day in your region the assessor will complete a similar criteria sheet and may write comments to help you improve. They will also mark whether you have met each objective with 'Competent' or if you need further training with an 'Not Yet Competent'.



Each of the lists in the following sections contain the full criteria for practical assessment. You will need to meet all of the criteria for practical assessment, as well as the online modules.

Online modules include identifying colours and markings, items of the grooming kit and parts of the saddle/bridle. You may want to revise these before taking the online quizzes!

Equipment for BD Horse Care

Required resources

If attending an assessment with your own horse/pony you will need to provide the below equipment otherwise this will be provided for you at the assessment venue.

All candidates will be expected to bring their helmet and gloves and wear suitable footwear. Long hair should be tied back and no jewellery should be worn.

Introductory Certificate

- Headcollar and lead rope (of appropriate size and fit for the horse)
- Hoof pick and brush
- Snaffle bridle (already fitted to the horse)
- Saddle (of appropriate size and fit for the horse)
- Saddle cloth/numnah (as appropriate)

Preliminary Certificate

- Headcollar and lead rope (of appropriate size and fit for the horse)
- Well-equipped grooming kit, suitable for competition preparation
- Tack cleaning equipment (sponges, soap, warm water, leather conditioner)
- Tail bandage
- Rug of appropriate size for the horse (preferably suitable for travel)

Novice Certificate

- Headcollar and lead rope (of appropriate size and fit for the horse)
- Equipment suitable for a trot up
- Well-equipped grooming kit, suitable for competition preparation
- Washing equipment suitable to wash a horse's tail
- Plaiting equipment (including both bands and thread)



Introductory Care Certificate

Revision guidance and things to consider

There are suggested questions and things to consider below for each practical module. You might be questioned on these during a practical assessment.

Module 1B – Safe handling of horses

Things to consider:

- How would you approach a horse in the stable, and would this be different if the horse was tied on the yard or to a trailer?
- What would you need to consider when approaching a horse that is out in the field?
- When might you give a horse a treat and what could you give?
- Safe and unsafe areas to tie your horse, think about the safety of your own horse/pony, as well as the safety of other people, horses and objects.
- How would you secure your horse/pony's leadrope?
- How would you safely release a horse into a field?



There are online sections of this module which have to be completed, as well as practical demonstration.

Module 1C – Grooming kit

Things to consider:

- Items of the grooming kit—how many can you name?
- How often should you be picking out your horses feet and why?
- Consider the reasons for grooming your horse/pony, think of as many reasons as you can.



Module 1D – Saddlery

Complete the online sections of this module, as well as practical demonstration, in order to meet the complete Introductory criteria.

Things to consider:

- Can you tack up your horse safely and correctly?
- How you would check the basic fit of your horse/pony's tack (i.e. How would you check the saddle is placed correctly, can you fasten the numnah/saddle cloth appropriately, how do you know if the bit is the correct size?)
- How would you check the tightness of the noseband and throatlash?

Module 2C — Grooming

- Can you recognise and name various items of the grooming kit?
- Can you show how to use the items of the grooming kit effectively?



Module 2D — Fitting and care of saddlery

- Do you know how to fit a snaffle bridle and make sure it is safe?
- Can you recognise and name different nosebands and understand how they fit?
- Do you know the difference between general purpose and dressage saddles? Can you recognise when they are a good or poor fit?
- Can you show how to clean and care for tack? Do you know how you might care for the different materials?
- Do you know how to take a bridle apart and can you reassemble it correctly?

Stay at home practise tip!

Spend an afternoon revising with your grooming kit or bridle to hand. Take out all the pieces and add a sticky post-it note to each one with your answer. It's revision so don't worry about checking to find the answer, it'll help you remember in the long term! Get a parent, guardian or sibling to check your answers afterwards.



Module 2E — Stable Routines

- Can you fill and weight a haynet correctly and then tie it up safely for a horse to eat?
- How would you safely lift heavy items such as bales of hay and buckets of water?
- Can you show how to muck out a stable, selecting the correct tools depending on the type of bedding?
- Do you know the positives and negatives of different types of bedding?

Module 2F — Horse Clothing

- Can you bandage your horse's tail correctly and safely?
- How would you put on or take off a rug safely and correctly?
- Do you know what equipment you should use to travel your horse? Can you select the appropriate items and explain their use?

Don't forget!

- Ask for help if you need it, try a friend or stable manager
- Safety first, make sure you're not putting yourself or others at risk
- Practise makes perfect, and it pays to be patient
- Get creative! Practise lots at home if you can't get out to see your horse, old rocking horses can be great mannequins!

Module 3B Trot up

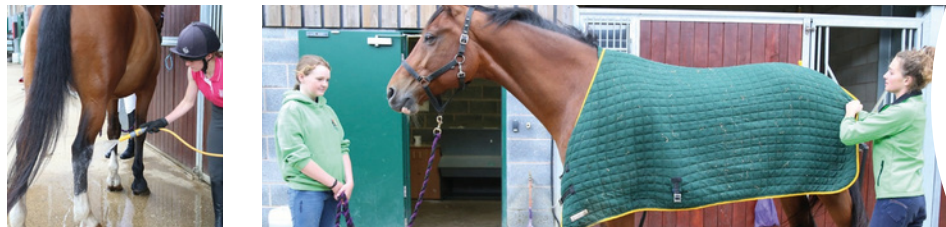
- Do you know how to prepare your horse for a pre-competition inspection?
- How would you present yourself for a pre-competition inspection?
- What protective clothing would you need?
- Can you demonstrate walk, trot and turning your horse correctly in hand for an inspection?



Why not try practising at home with your horse!

Module 3C Washing Horses

- Can you demonstrate how to wash a horse's tail safely and effectively?
- How would you prepare your horse's mane and forelock for plaiting?
- Can you plait your horse's mane, securing the plaits with rubber bands? Can you do the same using needle and thread?
- Do you know of any other ways to secure your horse's plaits? Which method do you prefer and why?
- Can you demonstrate how to remove your plaits safely without damaging the mane?



Module 3F Rugs, Bandages and Boots

- Can you recognise various types of rugs and their uses?
- What are the differences between stable, turnout and cooler rugs? How would you recognise each?
- When might you use a cooler rug?
- When might you need to use a liner?
- Can you apply stable bandages to front and hind legs safely and securely? Why might stable bandages be used?
- Can you apply exercise bandages to front and hind legs safely and securely? Why might exercise bandages be used?
- Do you know the pros and cons for the use of exercise bandages?
- Are you able to apply brushing boots to both front and hind legs? Can you recognise whether they fit the horse?
- Can you apply over reach boots? How might you know whether they fit the horse?
- When are bandages and boots not permitted? Do you know why?
